#### **Promote an Antibiotic Amnesty**

People across the Pennine Lancashire are being asked to return unused antibiotics to any local pharmacy as part of an Antibiotic Amnesty in support of World Antibiotic Awareness Week (18-24 November). By handing in unused or out of date antibiotics we can all help to stop them being used inappropriately and slow down the development of antibiotic resistance.

#### De-label false / spurious penicillin allergies

**False allergy** to **penicillin** is associated with increased healthcare utilisation, surgical site infection, treatment failure for common infections, and has a negative impact on antimicrobial stewardship. If we are able to remove **false allergy** listings on patients, this would benefit both patients and our healthcare system. It is estimated about only about 10% of patients labelled as penicillin allergic are truly allergic.
