

Farco-fill Protect

Farco-fill Protect is a sterile solution that comes in a ready-to-use syringe. It is used to inflate urethral and suprapubic Foley catheter balloons.

It contains 0.3% triclosan, a broad-spectrum antimicrobial agent, and is used in catheters that may remain insitu for up to 4 weeks.

Whilst Farco-fill could possibly extend the wear time of the catheter and reduce the frequency of catheter changes and clinical interventions needed to address blockages, the current evidence for its use is limited.

The current Joint Continence and Catheter Formulary for East Lancashire contains catheter choices which include prefilled syringes of sterile water in the pack.

Farco-fill Protect would be used as an alternative to the prefilled syringe and therefore an additional prescription would be required.

Given that NICE recommends more evidence is needed to determine the clinical effectiveness of Farco-fill Protect in terms of reducing encrustation, it is currently NOT recommended for prescribing within East Lancashire.

• Farco-fill Protect should NOT be prescribed by GPs in East Lancashire

Self-Care
